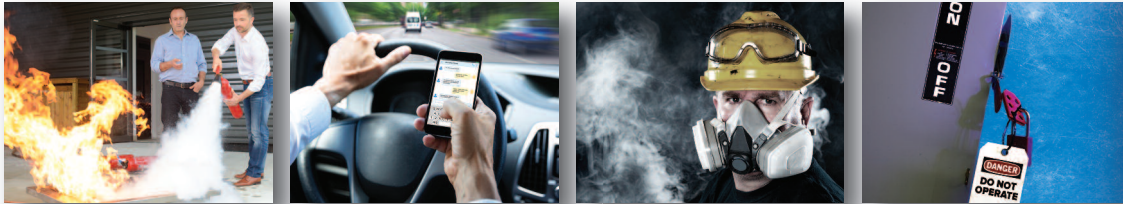

 - Fire safety is one of the core safety standards under OSHA and the NFPA and affects all types and sizes of industries. Employers should train workers about fire hazards in the workplace and what to do in a fire emergency. If you want your workers to evacuate, or if you expect them to use firefighting equipment, you should train them on how to escape or give them appropriate equipment and train them to use the equipment safely. This presentation will cover:
 - o Fire safety laws, regulations and standards
 - o Workplace fire statistics: causes, injuries, etc.
 - o History of workplace fires and impacts in America: Triangle Shirtwaist Factory, Cleveland Clinic Fire, and Imperial Food
 - o Portable fire extinguishers placement, operation, inspection and maintenance
 - o Building fire detection/suppression system inspection and maintenance
 - o Building life safety practices and systems
 - o Common workplace fire hazards and controls
 - o Emergency evacuation planning and training

- 10:15 a.m. **Distracted Driving Safety Tips for Your Employees**
- *Stephen J. Pakosh, Health & Safety Training Specialist, PA Bureau of Workers' Compensation*
 - Transportation accidents continue to be the number one cause of all workplace fatalities and injuries. Nearly all companies have employees traveling for many different reasons – trucks delivering products, vendors dropping off products, sales people calling on clients and employees traveling on company business. The presenter will provide an understanding of the actual and potential hazards they may confront while driving distracted including National Safety Council statistics and recommended solutions for drivers to reduce their chances of being involved in a collision. He will cover these key points for employees:
 - o Define the various types of distractions that interfere with safe driving
 - o Understand the importance of removing such distractions from employees driving
 - o Recognize why this subject is so important to the driver personally as well as those who drive company vehicles
 - o Evaluate the high risks they might encounter during their driving
 - o Recognize the importance of constructing and enforcing driver policies for your staff
 - o Make drivers and roads safer by taking the necessary precautions to not be a distracted driver
- 11 a.m. **Respiratory Protection Standard – How to Comply**

 - Citations for lack of proper respirator protection has moved up to #4 on the General Industry list of violations cited by OSHA. OSHA requires that employers protect the health of their employees who are exposed to hazardous levels of airborne contaminants. These include chemical/biological or radiological hazardous substances. We will cover:
 - o Assessing airborne hazards and identifying the need for a Respiratory Protection Program
 - o The medical review process – approving personnel for respiratory use

- o Voluntary and mandatory respirator use — is there a difference?
- o The written respiratory protection program with worksite-specific procedures — the program Administrator
- o Respirator selection: hazards/protection factors/fit factors/use
- o Maintenance and care requirements, including a change out schedule for respirators and filters/canisters (What is ESLI?)
- o The training requirements — hands on use!
- o Program evaluation and documentation

1 p.m. **Electrical Safety, Lockout & NFPA 70E - Best Practices — “Will that be FLASH or CHARGE?”**

- There are two primary hazards associated with electrical energy — the potential for electrical contact injury (shock) and the potential for arc flash and blast. This session will discuss the required and best practices for managing an electrical safety program to prevent employees from being shocked or impacted from an arc flash event. The session will discuss the 2018 version of the NFPA standard including changes from earlier versions. During the session participants will:
 - o Understand the nature, mechanisms and scope of occupational electrical hazards
 - o Learn how lockout/tagout changes significantly when applying NFPA 70E principles
 - o Understand what should be in an effective electrical safety work practices program
 - o Know when and how electrical work is permitted on energized systems
 - o Identify some of the most commonly violated rules and most dangerous electrical risks in organizations
