RE: **PA Chamber memo: Oppose H.B. 265 – Redefining unemployment compensation**

The PA Chamber urges you to oppose H.B. 265 to expand eligibility definitions in Pennsylvania’s unemployment compensation law. The House may consider the bill this week.

H.B. 265 would grant UC eligibility to various categories of public school employees during the summer months. According to the PA Department of Labor & Industry’s website, “Unemployment compensation (UC) is money paid to workers who have lost their jobs through no fault of their own.” UC is intended to provide temporary wage benefits for these individuals as they actively seek new employment. We appreciate the intent behind H.B. 265 but respectfully suggest this bill contradicts the fundamental purpose of UC since these employees are not laid off or seeking new employment.

Pennsylvania employers have historically paid some of the highest taxes in the country to fund UC – federal data from 2024 show PA employers’ average UC tax rate is over 50 percent higher than the national average. The same data show our average weekly benefit exceeds the national average and we have one of the top 10 most expansive eligibility standards. The PA Chamber supports UC but also encourages lawmakers to maintain the program’s focus on its intended recipients.
